TOP PERFORMERS

The top performers are those students with the best academic results calculated using UMS scores. The UMS (Uniform Mark Scale) is the method used by examination boards to convert the marks attained in each examination unit and series into scores. Grades are then calculated using grade boundaries set at particular UMS scores. This process standardises the marking of papers between different examination boards, allowing a fair comparison between final grades achieved by students. The average UMS scores of the top performers in each year group are indicated below alongside their grades.

LANGUAGE EXAMINATION RESULTS

Students studying French, German and Greek undertake a series of language examination certifying their skills as non-native language speakers. There are six independent diplomas, which correspond, respectively, to the six levels of the Council of Europe's Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR). The qualifications are recognised worldwide, both at university and professional level. Students take these examinations in order to stimulate their learning and to gain a formal external certificate. For students who do not choose the respective language to IGCSE level in Year 10, this gives them, if they are successful, a highly-respected French language certificate.

FRENCH DELF/DALF EXAMINATION

The DELF and DALF are diplomas awarded by the French Ministry of Education to prove the French language skills of non-French candidates.

IELTS RESULTS

The IELTS examination, which is jointly managed by Cambridge English Language Assessment, the British Council and the IDP: IELTS Australia, assesses the language proficiency of those who want to study or work in environments where English is the language of communication. The 9-band scale clearly identifies proficiency level, from non-user (band score 1.0) through to expert (band score 9.0). IELTS is the world's most popular English language test for higher education and is recognised by universities and employers in many countries around the world, as well as by professional bodies, immigration authorities and other government agencies.

The School is pleased to report that all of its 2016/17 graduates who were required by their chosen universities to achieve an IELTS score of 6.5 or above were able to progress to their university education.

ANGLIA EXAMINATIONS IN ENGLISH RESULTS

Anglia Examinations England offers a comprehensive and structured ten-level programme of assessing English language competence from beginner through to full competence as an expert user. The levels include equivalencies to the CEFR (Common European Framework of Reference) Levels for Languages. The Anglia examinations measure all four language skills: listening, reading, writing and speaking. The School is an official Examination Centre for Anglia Examinations England and examinations take place in January and June each year.

ECDL EXAMINATIONS

The ECDL is the European Computer Driving Licence (www.ecdl.org and www.ecdl.com.cy). This is a highly-respected and internationally recognised standard of ICT competence and a formal qualification in computing skills. ECDL Base comprises 4 modules: Word Processing; Spreadsheets; Computer Essentials; Online Essentials, and the higher level is called ECDL Standard (the 4 Base modules + 3 optional modules).

YEAR 9: CAMBRIDGE SECONDARY CHECKPOINT

The School enters all Year 9 students for the Cambridge Secondary Checkpoint tests as an important means of standardised external assessment at the end of Year 9. The tests are considered to be accurate predictors of students' potential in their future Cambridge International IGCSE examinations. Checkpoint scores are from 0.0 to 6.0.

YEAR 6: CAMBRIDGE PRIMARY CHECKPOINT

The School enters all Year 6 students for the Cambridge Primary Checkpoint tests which provide valuable feedback on each student's particular strengths and weaknesses at the end of their Primary education, before progression to the next stage of education in Secondary School. The Primary Checkpoint in Year 6 also provides a useful benchmark for comparing with the Secondary Checkpoint that students sit in Year 9. Both tests also produce useful statistics indicating how the Heritage and its students compare internationally with other schools and learners at the same stage of education. Checkpoint scores are from 0.0 to 6.0.
